ZOONOTIC CONCERN

plague

Cause: Yersinia pestis

Occurrence in animals: wild rodents mainly (rats, squirrels, prairie dogs, mice)

Source in animals: blood and saliva

Exposure: flea bites; bites and scratches by infected animals

Symptoms:

• Animals:

- buboes (abscesses)
- frequently death
- Humans.- two main presentations:
 - bubonic (fever, chills, muscle ache, headache, swollen glands)
 - pneumonic (fever, cough, chills)

Precautions:

- Good personal hygiene:
 - WASH HANDS after handling animals and their environment
 - No eating, drinking, smoking, ... around animals
- Handle potentially infected animals with gloves
- Wear long sleeves and gloves for field studies
- Treatment of wild-caught rodents against ectoparasites
- If accidental exposure should occur, seek medical attention immediately
- Organism can persist for a few months in the environment
